Prof. Marc Zolver who identifies at home in France by the title "Technique International" is currently based at the University of Nairobi as an industry-academic expert. Through Prof. Zolver's presence, the University of Nairobi is a beneficiary of agreements between the Government of Kenya and the French Development Agency (AFD) amounting to Kshs 4.6 billion aimed at improving and opening up available academic training in the Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics areas in Kenya.

Prof. Zolver previously worked as the Vice president of International Affairs at CentraleSupélec, Université Paris-Saclay. He was also the Vice Dean of the International Affairs Office at Centrale Paris where he worked as an instigator and coordinator of two ERASMUS MUNDUS action 2 programmes.

He has 14 years of work experience as a Research Engineer in France (IFPEN), Germany (European Southern Observatory), and Observatoire de la Côte d'Azur as a Grant from the French Academy of Sciences (France).

Prof. Zolver is working with the University of Nairobi in the promotion of links with industry as well as enhancing internationalisation in partnership with top French Science and Engineering universities.



# THE UoN EXCHANGE PROGRAMME

The University of Nairobi takes great pride in its strategic partnerships with various institutions around the world to promote student and staff exchanges.

Every year, students and staff from the university's faculties leave for other countries under various exchange programmes. About 20 students take part in short-term and long-term exchange programmes annually. In 2022, sixteen students from the Faculty of Arts and Social Science, Faculty of Veterinary Sciences, Faculty of Law, and Faculty of Science and Technology were involved in the programmes.

The exchange programmes allow students to network with their counterparts from other countries. On the other hand, the programmes offer opportunities for academic members of staff to carry out joint research and training with their counterparts.

Some of our exchange partners include Soka University and Hokkaido University in Japan and Nelson Mandela University and University of Pretoria in South Africa.

Most of the European partnerships with the University of Nairobi are under the auspices of the Erasmus Plus programme which is funded by the European Union. They include universities such as Hradecrállove University (Czech Republic), University of Ghent (Belgium), Gothenburg University (Sweden), and Pompeu Fabra University (Spain).

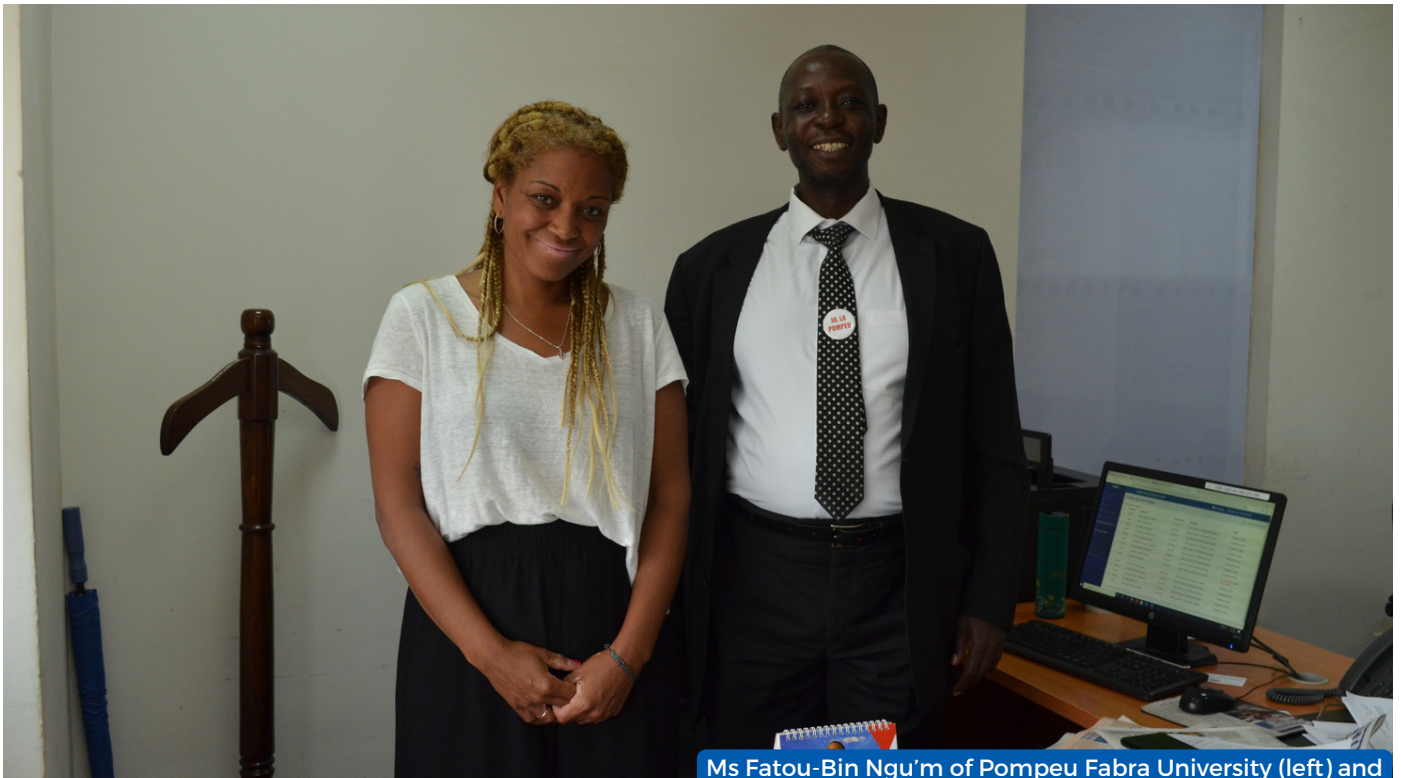

Quitting my job and leaving my home country Nigeria in 2020 to pursue an MBA at the University of Nairobi is certainly one of the highlights of my professional journey.

I was looking for an opportunity to broaden my knowledge, meet new people, and also get to know more about the Kenyan culture. Once I arrived, settling in Nairobi especially in the heat of the Coronavirus pandemic was not as seamless as I had envisioned. The movement restrictions imposed during the lockdowns made it impossible to physically meet my classmates because all the lectures and examinations were held online.

Fast-forward to two years later. I have formed some valuable relationships from our online interactions. Nairobi to me is a melting pot of diverse cultures, people, and experiences. Living in Nairobi has been a positive experience. The people are easygoing and kind. Ugali is the staple food and I actually know someone who eats ugali five times a week.

I love the patriotism that I have seen around me. There is a silent "I am proud to be Kenyan" attitude that cuts across people of different tribes and socio-economic classes. I have encountered Boda Boda (motor cycle) riders and top executives alike adorning their wrists with a beaded bracelet of the Kenyan flag as part of their daily dress ensemble. One thing I was not prepared for, however, was the cold weather. It is rare to find air conditioning sets in Kenyan homes because the weather is cool most of the time. Sometimes during the heavy traffic jams I am reminded of the city of Lagos where this is not an unusual occurrence.

As I wind up my study programme and enthusiastically look to the future, I am grateful to have experienced life in Nairobi.

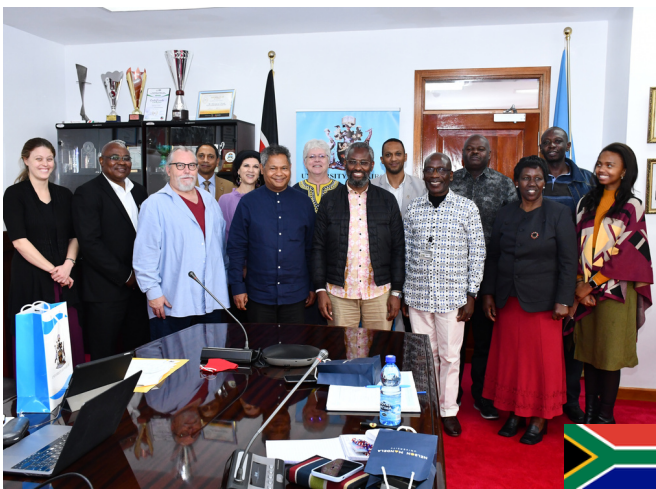

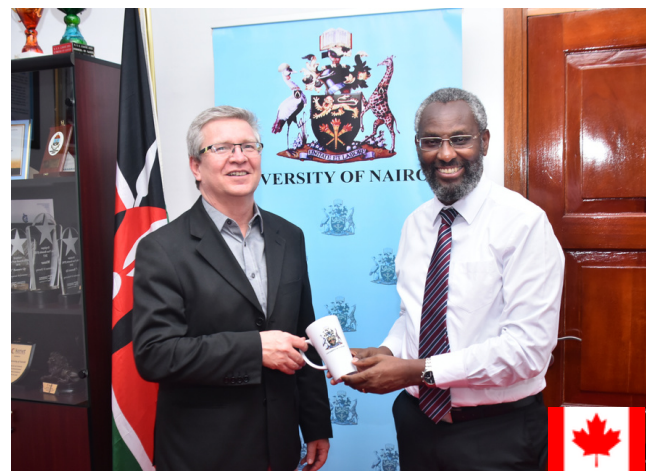

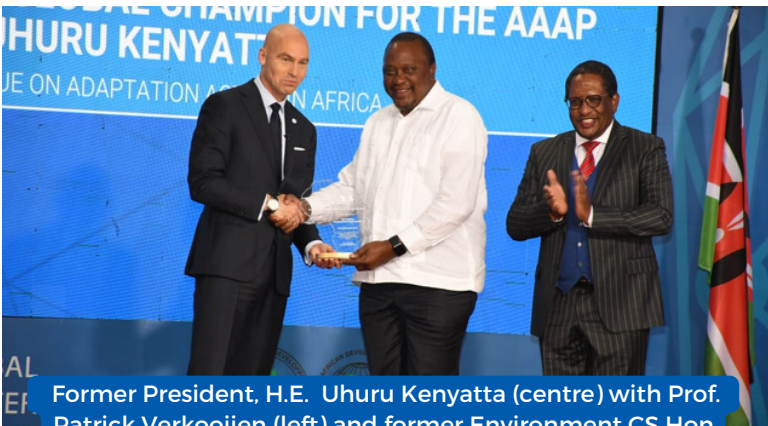

On 7 July 2022, His Excellency Hon. Uhuru Kenyatta, former president of the Republic of Kenya, was awarded the Global Champion Award by the CEO of Global Center on Adaptation, Prof. Patrick Verkooijen, for his exceptional work in creating ways in which the country can counteract the effects of climate.

On the same day, President Kenyatta witnessed the signing of an MoU between the University of Nairobi and the Global Center on Adaptation (GCA) to scale up adaptation efforts in Africa through a project titled, 'Enhancing and scaling up climate adaptation for resilient infrastructure in Kenya and the East African region'. The agreement worth Kshs 140 million, will see the University deliver a master class on climate change and conduct a competition for innovative climate change solutions among the youth. The top three innovative solutions will be awarded Kshs 5 million each.

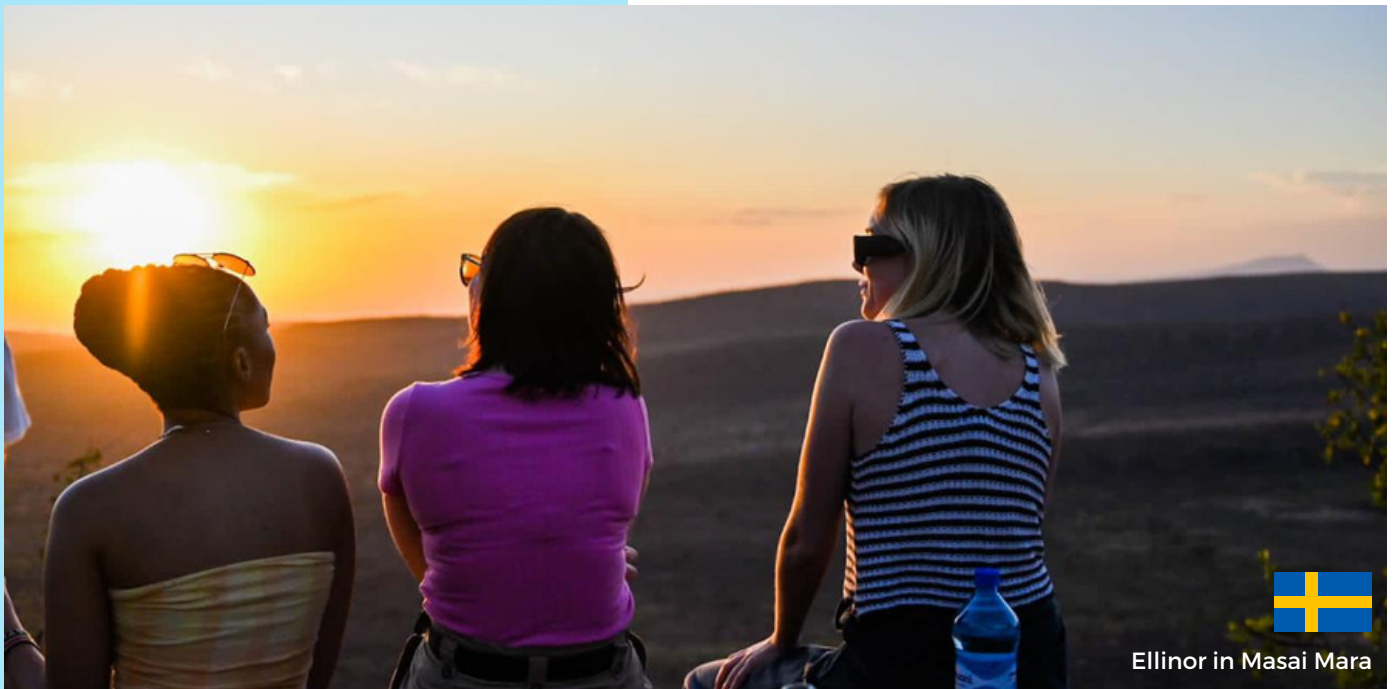

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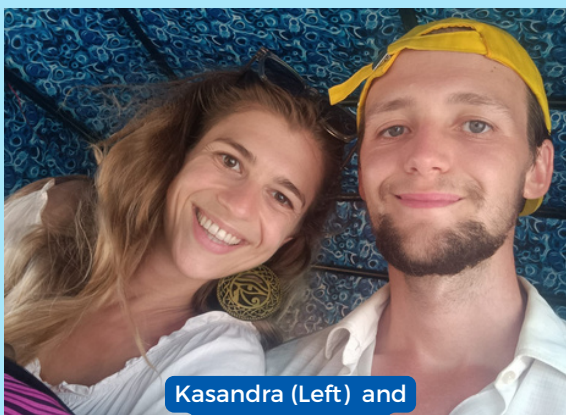

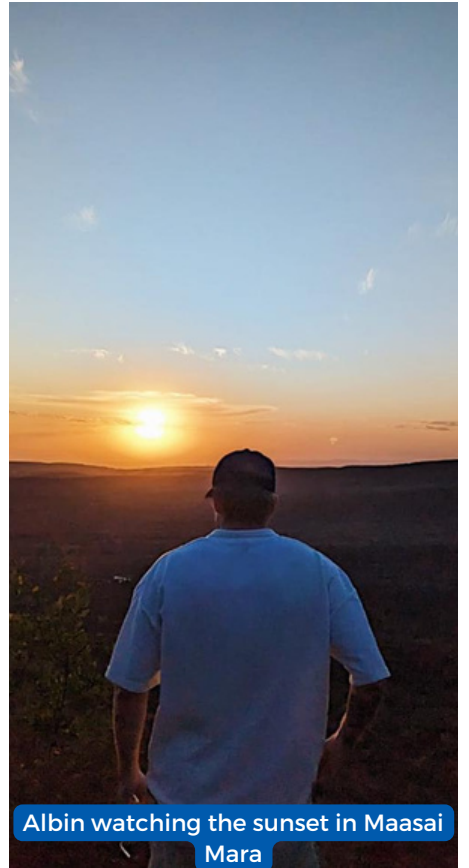

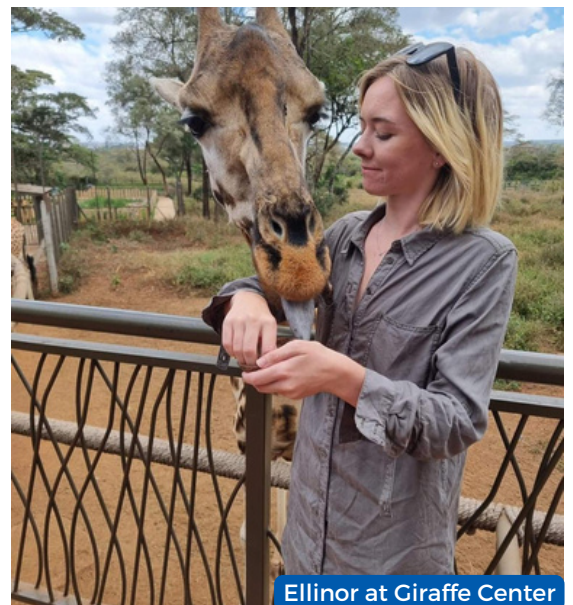
